## 4. Clinical condition or situation to which this PGD applies

Clinical condition or situation to which this PGD applies	To produce mydriasis prior to eye examination, intravitreal injection, or laser treatment
Criteria for inclusion	<ul> <li>Adult patients for the above procedures</li> <li>Paediatric patients of all ages requiring ophthalmic examination.</li> </ul>
Criteria for exclusion	<ul> <li>Consent not gained</li> <li>Previous local or systemic reactions to the medicine</li> <li>Known or suspected hypersensitivity to any of the ingredients</li> <li>Tropicamide is contraindicated in narrow angle glaucoma and in eyes where the filtration angle is narrow as an attack of angle closure glaucoma may be precipitated.</li> </ul>
Cautions including any relevant action to be taken	<ul> <li>Pregnant or breastfeeding patients</li> <li>Seek further medical advice for the following:</li> <li>Patients with hyperaemia as systemic absorption could be increased</li> </ul>
Action to be taken if the patient is excluded	<ul> <li>Record reasons for exclusion in patient notes</li> <li>Inform doctor</li> <li>Advise patient on alternative treatment</li> </ul>
